Total School Immersion Pilot

Grant Award Funds Week-Long Elachee in Your School Program

Thanks to a \$5,000 grant award from Walton Electric Trust, Inc.'s Operation Round Up[®] 1,052 students at Craig Elementary kicked off the New Year enjoying a week of Elachee ecology programming. This grant fully-funded student program fees for a K-5 pilot outreach program: Elachee in Your School Environmental Immersion.

The Elachee team taught a five-day series of nature education classes, plus delivered a STEAM-night program! Each participating K-5 student at this Gwinnett County Public School benefited from grade-specific content meeting curriculum standards while complementing classroom instruction.

Topics for Kindergarten, 1st, 3rd and 5th grades ranged from meteorology,



geology, Georgia aquatic habitats, water resources and pollution to Georgia landforms, as 2nd and 4th graders visited the STAR-LAB portable planetarium. For schools unable to

Avoid Hitchhikers

Be prepared before heading into the woods this spring and summer.

Tick Facts

- Georgia is home to 21 species of ticks, four of which feed on humans.
- Georgia's tick season is during warm months, April through October.
- Ticks dislike short vegetation and sunny, dry environments.
- Only 2-percent of a single Georgia tick species carries pathogen/disease.
- 'Attached' ticks do not feed within the first 24-48 hours or transmit diseasecausing organisms during this time.



Tick Prevention

- Stay on marked trails. Avoid brushing up against vegetation.
- Wear long pants, and when possible tuck pant legs into socks and tuck shirts under belts.
- Wear a hat or other head covering to prevent ticks' access from overhead limbs and leaves.
- To repel ticks, use products containing DEET on skin and clothing. To repel and kill ticks, use an aerosol containing Permethrin ONLY on clothing.
- Ticks can attach themselves to any part of your body, so check hair and scalp, inside the ears, under arms and behind knees.
- Routinely check pets and administer regular flea and tick prevention.

Tick Removal

If you find an 'attached' tick:

- DO gently remove with fine tweezers, grasping the tick close to the skin.
- DO NOT apply a lit match or Vaseline product to the tick while attached as this may cause it to regurgitate. If the tick regurgitates, this could infect you with a tick-borne pathogen.

Three ways to dispose of a tick:

- Drown it in rubbing alcohol;
- Suffocate it between two layers of tape;
- Flush it down the toilet.

The first two options allow you to keep the tick in case any symptoms were to arise, and you would like to send the tick for medical pathogen testing.

Hiking Trails Mileage Marker and Mapping Update

Did you know that community volunteers, led and guided by Elachee's staff, have developed much of the 63,360 linear feet of hiking trails in the Chicopee Woods Nature Preserve?

Developing and installing the hiking trails' mileage marker signage and map system represents a significant Chicopee Woods' wayfarer project that began in the early 2000s. Elachee staff and volunteers originally placed color-coded mileage markers along the hiking trails that approximate quarter-mile distances along each trail. To this day, tens of thousands of hikers each year use these markers to navigate this 12-mile hiking trail network found within one of Georgia's largest protected green spaces.

Emergency responders also make use of the map system to find hikers needing assistance in the Preserve. As well, the markers aid in timely Preserve management efforts when hikers can



accurately pinpoint the location of fallen trees blocking a trail or to report other issues.

The next significant marker update occurred in 2013 when Girl Scout Troop 10811 mapped mileage markers and hiking trails using GPS devices and computer software. Volunteer trail crew projects relocating trails, changing signage and maintenance in 2018 have necessitated updates.

Elachee volunteer David Scobey has graciously undertaken the most recent effort to maintain this system. To measure and confirm trail distances, David has traveled the hiking trail system multiple times, using both a handheld measuring wheel and a GPS unit. Data collection



includes the newly designated .4-mile Bridge Trail partitioned from the Dunlap Trail last year to limit trail name overlap. As expected, his findings confirm trail distances have changed over time due to hiking trails' relocation.

What's different?

David is now in the process of changing existing mileage marker placements to reflect the adjusted distance measurements along each hiking trail. He is also installing new green mileage markers on the Bridge Trail, its assigned blaze color. Changing terminus mileage markers to reflect the actual trail length makes them more precise. For example, a trail that ends at .68 miles will display that distance on the final mileage marker instead of rounding up to .75 miles, as it did under the former quarter-mile system.

When complete, the Elachee website will reflect these mileage measurement updates as will future Preserve trail maps published by Elachee. In addition, emergency responders and law enforcement will receive this data to support their efforts.

Otters Spotted

What a sight! Elachee reports a family of Eastern River Otters (*Lontra canadensis*) have been seen frolicking in Chicopee Lake.

You can find this endearing mammal, a member of the weasel family, in a variety of aquatic habitats across Georgia and much



of the Eastern United States, the Pacific Northwest and almost all of Canada.

Since otters are crepuscular animals, the best time to see them from the dock at the Chicopee Woods Aquatic Studies Center at Chicopee Lake is just after sunrise or before sunset. As a bonus, hikers report that they also see beavers (*Castor canadensis*) at this great habitat. **READ MORE:**
