

# **Citizen Scientists and Counting Birds**

### Flock to Elachee for Great Backyard Bird Count Festivities!

Which wildlife are we most likely to see, hear and experience each day? BIRDS! Birders of every age, skill level and background are invited to join us at Elachee and along the Chicopee Woods Hiking Trails, February 18-21, 2022, to observe birds, collect bird data and most of all, enjoy being in nature!

Saturday, February 19 from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m., visit Elachee for Great Backyard Bird Count Festivities! Kick off the day with an adult birding hike on Elachee's Lake Loop trail with local expert Peter Gordon, then head to the Nature Center for family-friendly birding experiences.

Activities will include a live birds of prey showcase, crafts, games, owl pellet dissection, other challenges and live animal showcases. We welcome Frozen Frenzee, Georgia Audubon, Hall County Library, University of North Georgia and Blue Ridge Raptors. Admission is \$10 per person, \$5 per member (ages 2 and up). **FIND DETAILS:** elachee.org/events

## Welcome Feathered Friends to Your Yard





### Plant Native. Remove Invasives.

Select Georgia-native or southeastearn native plants, trees and shrubs that offer vear-round food sources to birds and insects. Many invasive plant species out-compete native species birds and insects favor that also make up their diets. Eliminating invasives will help native species to thrive.

### **Provide Food and Water Sources**

Bird feeders provide excellent supplemental food sources for birds during times of scarcity (winter) and fresh water sources provide you with excellent bird watching opportunities! Offer multiple seed options, as varying species feed on different types.

### **Bird Houses and Nesting Boxes**

Install various sizes of nest boxes from which different species may choose. Be sure the ones you choose have drainage and ventilation holes. Remeber to clean out the box after each clutch has fledged.

### **Brush Piles and Dead Trees**

Brush piles with varying branch sizes and yard debris create a valuable habitat for roosting and nesting birds. Leaving dead trees alone (if safe) will harbor many wildlife species, including birds like woodpeckers and owls, providing a unique and exciting opportunity to observe this wildlife.

### Eliminate Pesticide/Herbicide Use

Insects are the primary food source for many bird species, specifically juvenile birds, providing them with necessary proteins and fats. Having an insect-free yard will likely result in little to no insecteating birds visiting your backyard.

#### Nest Balls

Creating and hanging balls of material near a feeder or next box is an easy and fun DIY project that to attract birds to your yard. Birds can pull items out of the ball to use as supplemental material for building their nests!

#### Construct nest balls using:


- Grapevine balls (find at craft stores)
- Yard debris like pine straw, pine needles and dead leaves
- Pet fur (collected after brushing)
- Natural fibers such as cotton balls, wool, jute or down feathers from a coat or pillow
- Fabrics such as string/twine, ribbon, yarn or lace
- Dryer lint
- NOTE: Do not use if you use fabric softener in the wash or dryer sheets, as this lint may contain chemicals harmful to birds.
